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

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

Who is judging your show car? 1968 Camaro and Meeting New Friends

I bought the 1968 Camaro in 2003. It was in fair shape, but needed some work. At the time, I was working a lot and did not have much time for the car. Basically, the car was just driven to some car shows and ice cream shops.

My wife had a job opportunity in Wisconsin and we just had our baby boy so we moved back to Wisconsin. We also decided that I would be a stay-at-home dad to raise our son Ryan. With a small child, the car did not get much attention and the motor needed to be fixed. When my son started kindergarten, I decided to start working on the car. I was hoping to find a good engine builder, but I did not know very many people in the area at the time that could help. One day while driving down the road, I saw a house that had a 1970 Camaro Pro Street and a 1970 Chevy Chevelle sitting outside. I told my wife I should stop in some time and talk to the guy.

A couple of weeks later, I was at a car show and by luck saw the 1970 Camaro. I went up to the owner, Dan and starting talking to him about his car. As we were talking, I see the 1970 Chevelle pulling in and mention I think the guy that owns the car lives just down the road from me. Dan tells me that it is his brother, Steve. After talking for a while, I find out that Steve has been building motors for many years.

When fall came around, I decided to ask Dan and Steve for their help in getting the car back in shape. They were more than willing to help. First the car went off to the body shop. There, a new roof was put on and other body work was done to make the car all clean metal again. The car



was painted a metallic silver. The car came back and it was time to start putting it back together. Dan came over whenever he had free time to help with the car. We started by putting in all new wiring in the car. The interior was replaced. We added front disc brakes onto the car and put in a stainless gas tank. Basically, the whole car was gone through with either new parts or we fixed the old parts. Dan was always there like clock work to make sure we kept on track. The car would have taken twice as long without his help.

Meanwhile Steve was taking care of the motor. It was a worn out 454 Chevy big block. At first this was going to be just a basic rebuild, nothing special. While talking to Steve, he happened to mention I should put dual carbs on the motor. At first I thought no, but Steve said "How many Camaros do you see with dual carbs anymore?"

I decided to do it, which ended up going from a simple re-build to being one tricked out motor. The motor was bored out and made into a 498 motor. It has two 650 Edelbrock carbs with one inch spacers. Internals are a Scat crank, forged pistons with 10:1 compression and custom made Comp cam. To top off the motor, we installed Edelbrock



aluminum heads and manifold. All billet aluminum accessories where used for finishing touches. The car can run on 91-octane without any problems. Steve also built a turbo 400 transmission and rebuilt the 12 bolt rear end to handle the new motor.

With the Camaro, my son Ryan has also become really interested in hot rods. I think he is more crazy about them than I am. Dan and Steve had a big influence on Ryan in making him a gearhead for the future. With the Camaro all together, my son loves to go cruising and wants to know when we can start the next project. By luck, I met two good guys willing to help with a 1968 Camaro and whatever the next project may be.

Local Hall of Famer

Hank Sauer (far right holding flag) directed race events as chief starter for sixteen years while dedicating his life to local short track auto racing. Hank grew up in the days of jalopy racing when every small town fairgrounds hosted some type of racing event. His first race car was built from a 1937 Ford coupe, purchased with no engine for \$20. He powered it with an old 6 cylinder engine from his dump truck and had victories at tracks in Rio and Edgerton.

His duties as chief starter began at his home track, Rio, located in the village park, where he also raced. Into the second season of racing they had no flagman. Hank knew all the rules and procedures, so he was talked into flagging. Then Portage started a track and he was asked to be the chief starter there. Then Columbus came calling, a track that he helped build and maintain. There he met Hal Woods, who owned Beaver Dam Raceway Park and promoted other local tracks. Woods was probably most helpful in Hank's career and this led him to other tracks, both paved and dirt tracks like Baraboo, Spring Green, Oregon, Jefferson, Lake Geneva and Slinger. Hank was widely respected, and was known to treat everyone fairly.

Hank's two worst experiences in racing came when he was hit by cars - once at Lake Geneva and another time at Columbus. A sand pile was brought in after the Columbus incident to offer some protection. Other tracks, such as Beaver Dam and Jefferson also then added this "protection."

One of his most memorable highlights in racing came when his flat head Ford, powered driver Johnnie McFaul, to 16 feature wins, in dominating fashion, in 1958 in Portage. No one beat them.

Another year to remember was 1956 when Darvin Rendahl, another Rio racer, purchased a new 1956 Ford. Hank was the mechanic and crew chief and they towed the car South to race a few NASCAR events. They finished 6th in a race on Daytona Beach, won by NASCAR legend, Tim Flock. Lee Petty was also in that race. That race, two years later, evolved into the Daytona 500 on the new high banked track.

Hank's son Terry became a Hobby Stock and Limited Late Model champion during his career, and still races part time. Grandson and third generation racer Steven has won Hobby Stock and Sportsman titles, and is preparing to move up to Late Models in a car he is designing himself.

Hank was inducted into the Southwestern Wisconsin Short Track Hall of Fame in 2016.

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Annual Mackinac Bridge Antique Tractor Crossing

Imagine sitting on an open air 1946 Farmall M tractor 200 feet above the water on a bridge with the wind blowing around you from grates in the bridge floor. The bridge sways, the wind blows a cold breeze around you. You look both directions, front and back, to see an unending line of antique tractors of all colors, makes, and models. Most tractors proudly displaying an unfurled American flag that shines crisp in the bright sunlight. They come from all over the United States to be a part of this one day bridge event.

2017 marks the 10th Annual Mackinac Bridge Antique Tractor Crossing presented by the Owosso Tractor Parts Company. Every year antique tractor enthusiast from all over the U.S., Canada, and even a few from the United Kingdom gather on a Thursday in September. There are over a thousand tractors unloaded from trailers in a staging field in Mackinaw City, Michigan. Some groups organize a tractor ride to the staging area, often traveling hundreds of miles for days through the countryside. It is quite a site to see all these tractors lined up preparing for the big ride the next day.

Friday at 6:00 a.m. we board a bus from our hotels in St. Ignace, Michigan to taxi to the staging area. As we cross the bridge on the bus the excitement builds as we all know soon we will be crossing the same bridge with a tractor. The second Friday of September is the only day of the year that tractors are allowed on the bridge. Traffic is reduced to

one lane for the Tractor Ride. 2016 saw 1350 antique tractor drivers take part in the parade.

The Mackinac Bridge opened in 1957. It is a suspension bridge spanning the Straits of Mackinac connecting the Upper and Lower Peninsulas of Michigan. The Bridge is five miles long with the deck being 200 feet above the water. The water is 295 feet deep under the bridge.

This past fall, James Nelson and Ralph Levzow took part for the second time in the Bridge Crossing. Early on Friday morning the National Anthem brings us all together. The Event Chairman instructs everyone to start their engines. Most are able to get them started, some by pulling, some by luck, & some get left behind. You do not have to have a fancy restored tractor to go on the ride, they come in all sizes, age, conditions, with even one guy who brings his self- propelled hay baler. All are welcome, who want to be a part of the event.

The tractors are assembled for the parade by groups. Jim & Ralph belong to the Ixonia Tractor Club

and cross with the members. Ralph driving his father, Maurice Levzow's, first tractor a 1946 Farmall M and Jim driving a Super 88 Oliver similar to what his father, Henry, drove. Every tractor must carry a tow strap for emergency towing. This comes in handy as if there is a breakdown a tractor cannot be left on the bridge. The speed of the ride is exhilarating at 10 miles per hour. Men and women of all ages over the age of 18 participate with some tractors even having a buddy seat. No wagons or riding on the fenders are allowed.

Meanwhile back at the other end of the Bridge, the crowds start assembling. Thousands of people line the roadway on both sides of the bridge and through the streets of St. Ignace to see the parade. Visitors and reporters anticipate the start of the Parade. The rush of excitement is felt by everyone as you start the journey across the Bridge. We all hope our tractors make it without problems but if one does occur it is quite a sight to see everyone rush to help keep the parade going. The first year we participated one guy had a flat front tire. Someone's

quick thinking attached a chain to the three-point on his tractor, lifted it up, and pulled it across. If you have concerns about your swimming ability, in case of a water landing, some do wear a life jacket for the crossing. As you progress, the wind picks up closer to the center of the Bridge. If you don't hold onto your hat, it is gone!

On the descent you have an amazing view of the long line of tractors in front of you and the crowds. People cheering and waving as you go. Our wives, Becky and Vicki, are positioned first off the Bridge for some great photos. They have just spent two hours talking with the crowd. We then proceeded down the highway into St. Ignace. Large crowds line the route leading to the Little Bear Ice Arena. There, all the 1300 tractors are assembled for viewing. The sounds and smells of the old equipment are mesmerizing as camaraderie of old and new friendships are formed.

A delicious meal is served with live music in the background. The tractors keep coming in throughout the day as it takes six hours for the last tractor to finish the Parade.




SHOW VENDOR: Car Show Photography and Poster Creation Available

JUDGE STORY: Fordman Ted's Mustang

From an early childhood of uncertainty and turmoil my brother, George, and I grew up not really knowing our parents. My Dad was an abusive alcoholic and my mother endured more than she should have and she left us with tears in her eyes. At the ages of seven and nine we were taken by the State of Texas and placed in the Waco State home.


At Waco, we were blessed by lovinggodparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Kultgen. They treated us with love and respect while we lived with 300 other kids.

As I grew up in Texas area I sometimes worked two jobs and attended night school and business college. My history with cars and racing started seriously in 1954, I was fortunate to get a job working at the Ford dealership in Waco in the parts department.

With that Ford parts department experience I was able to go on to the Dallas area and get a job working at a Ford dealership. With my previous night school and business College credentials under my belt they offered me a Ford marketing job and I excepted. From there I went on to start three other parts departments at Ford dealerships around the Dallas area and one in Houston.

I was fortunate to work with Carroll Shelby in 1965 and 1966 at Horn – Williams Ford before he went on to California in pursuit of his racing dreams.

Built lots of cars to show and race, my first serious drag car was a 1941 Ford Business Coupe with a 272-flathead engine that outran the Chevys. That's how I got to be called FordmanTed.



In the early 70's, I left Dallas and started life over in Houston where I began Ford Man's Mustang. I have owned over 50 muscle cars over the years however the Shelby's and the Bosses were my favorite. My business grew and from 1979 to 1989 Ford Man's was very prosperous. In 1989 business started to fall off so I unwisely invested in a race car hoping to regain some lost business.

In 1988/89 while into Super Stock Pro Racing with (Ford Man's Mustang) logo and car. We set the 1/8-mile record, under 6 seconds in 1989, that record stood for over two years. I still have the certificate to prove it! We went on to win several other races however it nearly broke me. Raced autocross with SCCA with several F/B Mustangs. Had Boss 302 and 351 Mustang drag car and show cars. Life was good until hurricane Allison hit and flooded out my shop and property, it was declared on the flood retention basin. We lost nearly everything The hurricane had dropped 38 inches of water in a 24-hour period.

During that time my daughter and her husband said they would buy my business however they were moving it to Wisconsin and talked me into moving also.

We moved the business and inventory to Wisconsin and started over as Fordmans Mustang LLC.

It was at this new shop where my daughter met Vickie Nelson who invited us to the First Annual Pardeeville Car and Truck Show. I had my 1966 Hertz Shelby in the first show and I helped with the judging

and have been one of the judges at this show for every year since.

During my life, I experienced loss, pain and grief and at one point became bitter. One time we were involved in a serious auto accident in which the vehicle, driven by my wife, had a blowout and rolled over several times. We both walked away from this accident with minor injuries. In 2010 I had a heart attack, when I arrived at the UW hospital they said I had a 95 percent blockage in three arteries. After the heart surgery, they said three months' recovery, after attending physical therapy I was back on my feet at work in three weeks.

I have come to realize that God has had his hand in my life and I live only because he has saved my life so many times.

As I travel the Lord's path may he guide and direct me with the Holy Spirit's help to do his will and minister unto others. I am my brother's keeper.

- God gets all of the glory as He works through the Church in this ministry outreach for our community.



Car Show Pie Recipe Cookbook

RHUBARB HICKORY NUT PIE

By: Joan Breneman

- 2 cups diced rhubarb 1 cup white sugar 2 Tablespoons flour Pinch of salt 1 egg, beaten 1/2 cup chopped hickory nuts
- Topping: 1/2 cup brown sugar 2 Tablespoons flour
- 2 Tablespoons butter

For pie: Mix together rhubarb, sugar, flour, salt and beaten egg. Let sit while you make your topping.

For topping: In a separate bowl, mix together sugar and flour, then cut in butter.

Pie assembly: Put rhubarb mixture into unbaked 9" pie shell, cover with topping. Sprinkle 1/4 - 1/2 chopped hickory nuts over the top. Bake 15 minutes in a 425° oven, then reduce heat and bake 30 minutes in a 350° oven.

CARAMEL CRUNCH APPLE PIE

Pie:

- 6 cups sliced peeled
- tart apples
- 1 Tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3 Tablespoons all purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon ground
- cinnamon 1 unbaked pastry shell (9 inches)

28 caramels 1 can (5 ounces) evaporated milk Topping: 1/4 cup all purpose flour 1/3 cup packed brown sugar 2 Tablespoons butter, softened 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Combine flour, brown sugar, butter and cinnamon; spread into an ungreased 8-in square baking pan. Bake at 400° for 6-8 minutes or until golden brown.

Cool; crumble and set aside. Sprinkle apples with lemon juice. Combine sugar, flour and cinnamon; toss with apples. Place apples in pie shell. Cut a circle of foil to cover apples but not the edge of the pastry; place over pie.

Bake at 425° for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 375°; bake for 35 minutes or until apples are tender. Meanwhile in a saucepan over low heat, melt caramels with milk, stirring frequently. Remove foil from pie. Pour caramel mixture over apples. Sprinkle with topping; return to the oven for 5 minutes. Serve warm.
