

Meet Chandler Park

The beautiful venue for the Pardeeville Community Car & Truck Show began in the year 1886 when several Pardeville citizens organized an association for the sole purpose of driving thier horses and carriages around on Sunday afternoons. To this end the 'Driving Association' purchased two parcels of land.

The eastern property, belonging to the Elliot-Kennedy family, sold for \$140. The western property and access road was owned by Yates and Virginia Ashley and sold for \$300. Virginia (Pardee) Ashley was a sister of village founder, John Pardee who funded the construction of a water dam to power a gristmill and sawmill on the location of todays 'Carols Cones'. The two land parcels are seperated by 'Willow Pond' or as it is now known, 'The Frog Pond' and did not connect to the lake as it does today. This allowed for a half mile track around the pond and through the properties.

In 1897 the Driving Association transferred the land to the village. At the time Dr. Joseph Chandler was the secretary and signed the deed transfer papers on behalf of the Driving Association. Because The Doctors signature appears on record at the Register Of Deeds Office in Portage some asserted that the property was donated by Dr Chandler when in fact the Driving Association sold it to the village for the sum of \$390. This

sale took place under the stipulation that the Curling Club would retain use of the facilities, provided no alchoholic beverages would be sold in what wast to be named, 'Lake Park'.

By the 1980's local developer Jeff Smith purchased the remaing Elliot-Kennedy property. As part of the agreement Smith was required to donate a portion of the property to the village as parkland. Our car show vernacular terms this area as 'Overflow'. Located east of the baseball field and bordered by Chandler Park Dr, Park Str., Green Str. and Elliot Str.

At various times in its history the park has been home to: a small zoo; a short-par golf course; camping sites; bath houses and was one of the first lighted football fields in the area. Today Chandler Park totals 20 acers. Originally a deep water marsh, Park Lake is an empoundment of the Fox River formed by construction of three dams, one of which produces electric power. Built in 1944, the hydroelectric dam generates 50kw/ hour, enough to power 50-100 homes depending on the season.

Rededicated in 1991 as Chandler Park, the grounds are maintained year round by no more than six hard working Dept. Of Public Works employees, all of which have asked to remain anonymous. These behind the scenes professionals plow the streets each winter and deck the halls for holidays. They repair



the rest rooms, replace the bulbs, empty the trash, prune trees, mow grass and clean up after vandals. On one occasion after a high wind storm struck days before our show they where on scene clearing fallen trees and brush. Likewise in 2016 after a volunteer spotted a large branch snagged in

the trees; DPW was on the spot with a boom truck and removed the threat to our guests high value show cars, before I could take their picture. Please join me in thanking our public employees for their support each and every year.

Kent & Karl's Sears Motorbuggy!

For those that like old and unusual vehicles look no further than Kent and Karl Jansen's very cool 1909 Sears Motorbuggy.

The story behind finding the Motorbuggy is a fluke. This century old plus machine was found at an auction. "My son Dan gave me a subscription to Antique Weekly and we saw the item in there. It was at an obscure public auction," Annie Jansen explained.


"The auction was Kaufmann Realty & Auctions and the people that sold it had the last name Sears," Kent Jansen explained. While they didn't know if there was any connection between the couple's last name and the founder of Sears, they thought it was a cool connection.

The auction was in October of 2016, and held just south of Springfield Ohio. It was a consignment auction and Kent and Karl Jansen bought the Sears Motorbuggy sight unseen. "We were incredibly surprised when we got it," Kent said. "It was way better than we thought it would be."

After getting the Sears Motorbuggy home, Kent said they did a bit of work on it that day. This was not a stretch because Kent and Karl run Jansen Brothers Garage and they work on and restore vehicles and tractors. "It was October and it got cold," Kent said. "We'd work on it and drive it. We had to fuss a bit. What we did was not really a restoration it was really just a good tune up."

The only other Sears Motorbuggy that the Jansen's have seen was in an auction in California that took place during the summer of 2017. Antique tractor collectors got a chance to look at the Sears Motorbuggy during January of 2018 when Minneapolis Moline collectors took a tour of both

Jansen Brothers Garage, and then of Kent and Karl's collections.

The Jansens are always great about sharing their finds and this past summer they took the Sears Motorbuggy to the Graham Bradley tractor get together in Ohio. The Motorbuggy fit right in, because like the Sears Motorbuggy, the Graham Bradley and other tractors were also sold through the Sears catalog.

While at the show, Kent offered to take excited collectors on rides. The rides though were on the street rather than the grass. "Sears had other cars than these," Kent Jansen said, "but this had to be kept on paved streets because it was underpowered. On a mud road, it would be a struggle to drive."

The car has many features that amazed Kent and Karl. "It has dual exhaust, a "tilt wheel" is the only steering and it has a buggy top that rolls up and the back opens up which is nice in the summer. It drives like a surrey," Kent said.

As far as the inside, it is set up like a buggy. "It has the original leather; I'd like to get a bit of repair on the

leather. It also has brass lights that are kerosene." Kent added.

This vehicle has been great fun for the family. "We took the kids and grandkids on rides at Easter. We took it to Teutopolis to parade and won Best of Show with it. It is a heck of a lot of fun to drive."

It is not surprising that this cool vehicle was sold through Sears Catalog because they sold everything, from clothes to houses to tractors. Then in the fall of 1908, the Sears catalog included, for the first time, an automobile and that car was the Sears Motor Buggy. This Sears car sold for a whopping \$395.00.

With automobiles the latest the craze Sears decided to get into this new fangled adventure and according to John Daly's Sears Motor Buggy website http://searsmotorbuggy. com/Sears, to do this they had Alvaro S. Krotz, who was famous for building an electric car, design and produce the car. The first cars were built in the Hercules Buggy plant in Evansville, Indiana. The company moved the manufacturing operations from Evansville to Chicago in late 1909. From then on, the Sears Motor Buggy was manufactured at the Sears Motor Car Works factory in Chicago, Illinois.

Kent has been able to narrow down his model as a solid tired runabout. Those cars that were built after 1910 came in five models with a top and fenders. In 1910, Sears offered the Model G, H, J, K, and L. Between 1908 and 1912 it is estimated at around 6,200 were made with around 1,000 of the 1909 runabouts like the Jansen's owned being manufactured.

A Sears Motorbuggy helped fill a want in the Jansen collection. Rumley tractors, an Indian motorcycle, a Gray tractor and more, the Jansens are avid collectors of the rare and unusual and the Motorbuggy fits right in!




Thunder Pony

A 1972 Mustang Mach 1 body with a Ford 427 engine and Bemco Chassis #113 was built in 1973 for a well known racer, Rich Somers, of Stevens Point, WI. The first night out Rich won the Super Late Model Feature race at WIR Speedway in Kaukauna, WI. In 1974, Rich also won the Track Championship and the Red, White & Blue Championship at WIR. In 1978 a small block Chevy engine was installed and Rich raced the car at many Wisconsin and Minnesota tracks, as well as, New Symrna Beach in Florida. Over the years, the chassis had several different style bodies, including a Fox Body Mustang and a Thunderbird.

The Thunder Pony was eventually sold to a driver from the Kaukauna area and raced at WIR with it's last Super Late Model win in 1992. A few years later Rich bought the Thunder Pony back with plans to restore it. Rich passed away just as he began the restoration. The car was then bought by Jon Alft of Wisconsin Rapids, WI and with information and photos from the past provided by the Somers Family, the Thunder Pony was restored as close to original as possible.



For those of you interested in classic cars or race cars from the past, plan a visit to the Hartford, WI Auto Museum. You will find many different brands of cars and trucks from the early 1900's to the 1980's. There is also a display of railroad items, as well as, a locomotive. Hartford was also the home of the Kissel Car which was manufactured in a factory there until 1931 and there are several of the Kissel Cars on display.

The Southeastern Racing Hall of Fame is also located at the museum. There is a lot of information about the drivers and cars that raced at the local dirt and asphalt tracks, as well as, race cars on display. The #90 Heilig-Meyers Ford which was driven by Dick Trickle during his NASCAR career is on display. Dick

was inducted into the Southeastern Short Track Hall of Fame in 2017. The car was purchased by Dick Karth from Junie Donlavey, a former NASCAR Team Owner, who Dick Trickle drive for. You will also see cars that Matt Kenseth drove during his NASCAR career, one of those being the car he won his first race with at Rockingham Speedway in 1998.

You will find very friendly, knowledgeable and informative staff at the Hartford Museum. I am sure you will enjoy the classic and race car displays as well as all of the many other historical items.



but he stocks more varieties of balloon sizes, shapes and colors than most balloon twisters offer. This allows him to keep the audiences always guessing what he is making out of the balloons, while he entertains using audience interaction, good "clean" comedy and wit to create fun for the whole family.

In addition to twisting balloons into the form of different creations (and giving them to the audience to take home), he will be blowing up a 6 foot balloon and climbing inside and hopefully back out. 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
