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

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

~ Racing History ~ Rio driver's NASCAR[®] connection

In 1934 Bill France and his family from Washington, D.C. were moving to south Florida. They stopped at Daytona Beach and decided to stay. Bill took a job at an Oldsmobile dealership.

In February, 1936 Bill and former racer, Sig Haugdahl, built a road course on Daytona Beach. World War II halted racing until 1946. In 1947, NASCAR[®] was born and the first race was held in February 1948 on the beach. They designed a logo in 1951 and the logo was changed five times over the years. Daytona Speedway was then built and the first pavement race took place in February 1959.

From about 1947 thru the early 1950's local dirt tracks were being built, one being near the now Rio High School, also at the Portage Fairgrounds and Columbus. Darvin Randahl from Rio raced at some of the local tracks and then decided to try racing on the NASCAR[®] level. Darvin, together with Henry Sauer, built a 1956 Ford and towed the car to Daytona. Darvin finished in sixth place and won \$600. Darvin had more starts with NASCAR[®] in 1956 and won a total of \$710.

Since that time many drivers from WI went on to race in NASCAR[®]. Dave Marcis, Larry Baumel, Alan Kulwicki, Dick Trickle, Jim Sauter and many others. For many years NASCAR[®] called their series The Winston Cup[®] and a couple of those cars will be on display at the Pardeeville Car Show, as well as, cars such as modifieds that raced on local dirt tracks.

We were also blessed by the presence of 16 cars from the Super Performers! They came from five states and two countries to be part of the show. It was indeed an impressive site to witness so many of these beautiful cars together and we are humbled



that they came in support of our event.

A cherished part of attending the Car Show is the conversations that abound: whether with new friends, old friends, or strangers... folks of all ages have stories to share. 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~ 1969 Pontiac Catalina ~ "ONE COOL CAT"

On February 11, 1976, I bought my 1969 Pontiac Catalina two-door hardtop coupe from the Pontiac dealer in Walworth, WI for \$895 less \$100 trade-in allowance for my other car. It had 70,000 miles on the odometer. It was decked out with Fenton wheels. wide track tires, tape deck, gauges, air shocks, obviously pre-owned by a younger fellow whom I believe was the second owner. Heck, I was only 37 at the time, so I drove it home.

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It was my daily driver for the nest 5 1/2 years and another 70,000 miles. I retired it in June 1981. It sat basically undriven for the next five years. Going to a couple of car shows in the early 80's gave me the "car show bug bite". It ran rough so I spent \$700 for a partial engine rebuild to get it running smooth again. Then I couldn't find anyone interested in doing the body work and paint, so I bought myself a small compressor, paint gun and the materials

and did it myself. I had the dual exhausts and the Superior wheels added before I painted it. It wasn't perfect, but passable, so I was off to my first car show in Cambridge. It rained all day. The seats were recovered shortly after that.

Those early years of '85, '86 and '87 were my learning years. Nobody even noticed it. So in the spring of '88, I reworked the body and repainted it using a larger air compressor and a different paint job better job. Then I started in "customizing" it - Lakes pies, Cal Custom spotlights, etc. From '88-'92 I won a few awards with it. but the competition was getting tough. By '93, I shut it down for the season minus two early spring shows. By then I had purchased two N.O.S. quarter panels door panels, rear bumper and a lot of smaller items.

I'd work on it in the evenings after work and on the weekend and finally







got it in primer and back on its wheels by the end of October, ready for winter storage.

In the Spring of '94, I started in on the paint work, designed the scallops, and painted those on it. More sanding and then the clear coat, and finally by August I was done and back on the show circuit again.

In '96, I purchased the correct vinyl for the seats and had them done up with a "custom" accent. More customizing followed. The "CAT" was starting to get noticed and I started winning a few awards. I redic the car in '06-'07 for the fourth time.

I had joined the Pontiac Oakland Club International prior to '05. I had a twopage spread with seven photos featured in the December '05 issue. I condensed that for this article. My story and photos made Hemmings Motor News twice prior to that year.

My car has been in the Almond, East Troy and Edgerton newspapers; also written about in the Jefferson paper. My "ONE COOL CAT" has covered some 50,000 miles in the last 39 years to shows and cruises basically in southeastern WI. I've got a house full of awards, including two "Best of Show" and "Best Pontiac". My wife says, "NO MORE TROPHIES." Ha! It has been one "heck of a ride". February 11 marks 40 years of ownership. I've got the only one around.

1946 Farmall M.

This Farmall M has been a part of the Levzow Dairy for over 65 years. It is not the work horse it once was when my grandfather purchased it. It is a 1946 Farmall M. My grandfather, Maurice Levzow, started farming on the farm we are still farming on in 1948 with his father-in-law. He first brought with him an Oliver 60 to replace the horses that were used before, but it was soon determined that it didn't have enough power. So it was traded in for the Farmall M, which was one of the biggest tractors you could buy at that time. It could easily handle a 3 bottom plow or an 8 ft. disc. He also purchased a 2 row cultivator that could mount on the tractor. It was also the talk of the neighborhood when grandpa bought a semimounted 7ft. sickle mower for the tractor because of how fast he could cut hay. It was the main workhorse on the farm for 20 years. A few other tractors were added during that time, including a 1940 Ford 9N which is also still on the farm today. Even though bigger tractors were added, the M still found a place on the farm with hauling loads, baling



hay, and other odd jobs. It was by far my grandfather's favorite tractor.

My grandfather everyday went the local gas station for coffee with his friends. On one of the occasions he left for coffee in November 2001, we sneaked the tractor off the farm to a neighbor who was going to repaint it for us. Since the tractor wasn't being used much at this time on the farm, grandpa didn't notice that it was missing. On a very bright, cold day, grandpa was reading the paper in his favorite chair when we brought the tractor home to surprise him. I drove the tractor in his driveway and parked it right outside his front door so that when we opened the door, he could see it right from his chair. With the sun shining on it, it looked better than when grandpa first bought it. He was so excited he came out in his slippers to see the tractor. Getting the tractor restored was what started the tradition of me taking the tractor to the Pardeeville Fourth of July Parade and the Pardeeville Tractor Show. This picture meant so much to us that we also had it made into an original watercolor that is displayed in our house.






























Showcasing the Works of Newton's Auto Restoration

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If you judge a collector car restoration shop by how fancy its building is, how much advertising it does or how high of a public profile it tries to keep, then Todd Newton's shop in little Spring Green, Wls., probably isn't going to blow your doors off.

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
If you prefer to make your judgments based on word-ofmouth, the amount of work a shop has lined up and other intangibles - such as general "feel good" vibe that some places just seem to have - then a shop like Newton's Auto Restoration might be right up your alley.

Newton's shop is about as grass-roots as it gets. From its three-man staff, to its old feed mill building-turned-shop, to it's homemade paint booth, the business is clearly more about substance than styles. But it's also one of those small town places that get rave reviews from its customers, some of whom are now coming from out of state to get in line to have their cards done at the "little business that could" in south-central Wisconsin.

"I think one thing people like about us is that I tell anybody that they are welcome anytime to come in and watch us working on your card," said Todd Newton, who owns and operates the business with help of his father, Ardell, and hired hand Eric Tomas. "We want to have lots of communication with them, because a customer can do a lot of damage. If you didn't do something you should have, and they're mad about it and start going around talking bad about you, it can do a lot of damage."

Getting positive feedback from customers doesn't seem to be a problem for Newton's though. The shop's stellar reputation is the main reason that it has survived for 23 years - including the past 16 working almost exclusively on collector cars. Todd Newton opened the business in 1993 after a stint in the collision repair business at a shop in nearby Reedsburg, Wis. The decision to go out on his own wasn't easy, nor was the choice to focus solely on collector cars beginning in about 2000. When you are starting basically from scratch in a little brick building in the rural Midwest, you don't get a steady stream of big-time car collectors rolling by your front door every day.

"It was a gamble to leave the place that I used to work (Schiefelbein Body Shop)



because that was a great shop," Newton said. "Leaving was a little scary, but to switch from collision repair to old cars really wasn't scary at all. I guess we switched over to all old cars by about 2000, somewhere in there, and by then we were heavy in old cars anyway."

"Basically, for me, it started out with collision repair, and I myself had done a few old cars and people saw them and liked what they saw, so I had started doing some restorations on the side for other people. Eventually, it seemed like I was getting more old cars then modern cars, and I decided that one had to go to do a fair job. And to be honest, I don't like the collision repair as much as the old cars."

These days the Newton's shop is filled with cars - mostly 1960s and early 1970s coupes and muscle cars. Todd admits he has a soft spot for Chevelles, but anything is fair game, and the shop get a nice variety of projects to work on. Some of the cars that come in don't need much more than a decent paint job. Others are in need of a lot more help. "We get both," Todd said. "Some cars, you really wonder why they're restoring it...but maybe it was the car they had in high school or their Dad had or whatever. But we get cars that are total basket cases that





come in in pieces, literally, and we get others coming in from California and have no problems whatsoever."

"We pretty much try to stay generic. We probably specialize more in 1960's and 1970's muscle cars, only because that's what I tend to like myself, and that's what I tend to buy myself. And when you're showing them more, it tends to attract that type of person. I myself like Chevelles, so I like to think we're really good at doing them. Eric, my hired man, he's more into Chrysler stuff, so he likes doing them. But we can handle about anything."

"The older stuff is a little more of a challenge and maybe you hit some swap meets and whatever (to find parts), but eBay is a wonderful tool. You can just about find anything on the internet, one way or another. I do whatever the customer

is comfortable with. If they want to take it on and find the parts, fine. If they don't want to deal with it, that's fine, too. Another thing where I think we're a little different than most shops...a lot of customers want to be part of putting their car back together and be a big part of it. That's fine. We let them do that if they want."

Newton is quick to point out the advantages of a small operation when it comes to organization and customer relations. With only three men and an open-door policy when it comes to customers, there isn't much unnecessary overhead, and there are very few things that the boss doesn't know about. "When you call here and I answer the phone, I'll probably be able to answer your question because chances are I'm the one working on your car," he said. "If you have too many people in your shop, you can start losing touch with what's going on."

Todd's father, Ardell, is the designated mechanic on staff "basically because he's a mechanic by trade, and he chooses to be the mechanic," Todd joked. "But he can do body work, too."

The shop handles everything from disassembly to paint, and almost all the tasks in between. "We farm out some of the upholstery work, and we're lucky to have Al's Interiors right here in town, and they're just great," Newton said. "I don't know what I'd ever do without them...We don't do seat covering, or new headliners, or convertible tops,"

"And with stainless repair, we do some of it, but when it gets to be a huge job, we send that out, usually to Vintage Vehicles in Wautoma, Wis."

With more cars waiting then

he can squeeze in the doors and a reputation that continues to grow, Todd admits it's hard to not wonder what a shiny new building with more room to grow might do for the business. On the other hand, he figures if his business isn't broken, there's no reason to fix it.

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"I guess I'm pretty much where I want to be right now. I'm not gonna say we wouldn't like to have a big fancy building, but with that comes overhead," he said. "We've had that conversation - about buying a new building or adding on - but I feel more comfortable here and it's the work done inside that counts."

"And if I add on, that just gives me more room for cars. I'll still fill it up! If you give me the room, I'll just stuff some more cars in it, that's all!"






Pie Recipe Cookbook: You asked for it... so we did it!!




 <u>Winner of Trophies</u> must be present to receive their trophy immediately, or have a designated representative to collect it at the time of distribution, or forfeit the rophy.
